year, Kalāheo High School held its first commencement for 205 graduates. Since then, over 7000 seniors have achieved Kalāheo alumni status. Many have left Hawaii to pursue education and careers on the mainland and around

Our alumni are doctors, lawyers, scientists, technicians, athletes, business owners, laborers, community leaders, and educators (including a few now at Kalāheo). They serve in every branch of the military, both at home and abroad. Many Kalāheo alumni are proud parents of second generation Mustangs.

In fact, most of this newsletter is about our alumni. As a 1983 Kalāheo graduate, I want other alumni to share my convictions about giving back to the school which guided us toward productive, successful futures.

Consider this scenario: If only 50% of Kalāheo's alumni joined the Foundation with at least a \$25 annual donation, our endowment would increase by over \$87,000 each year, soon creating a sizeable permanent source of funds.

Teachers and school programs always have needs for which the DOE does not provide. For example, this school year, Kalāheo will initiate the first of several Smaller Learning Communities by establishing ninth grade houses to address the specific academic, social and emotional needs of this age group.

Foundation grants—as well as alumni advisory board members, career speakers, and mentors—can support these communities of students and teachers. By giving our time, energy and money, we can help Kalāheo's kids achieve and excel.

The marquee that once stood between the auto shop and the highway was known as "Paula's Sign" because she fought so hard to get it erected despite environmental studies and other impediments. to support the school.

Librarian Martha Robertson recalls: "Years after Alex and Marisa had officially departed the premises, I drove onto campus one weekend morning and saw Bob, Paula and Alex planting a bed of orange-flowering plants around the school's Iliaina Street sign. Now, that's what I call being true to your school!"


1970s

SEPTEMBER

The Welcome Back Assembly kicks off the new school year. Open House brings hundreds of parents to campus for brief informational class sessions with teachers. College 101 Night and Senior Night help parents and students plan for the future. The mandated School Community Council begins work on the Kalāheo Academic and Financial Plan for School Year 2006-2007. For the second year, the Joint Venture Educational Fund underwrites Challenge Day, a program to help students focus on interpersonal relationships and improve the school's overall social atmosphere. "Switchin' Da Mix" is this year's Student Government theme as student leaders focus on developing new and "switching up" older traditions.

OCTOBER

With a "Bringing It Home" theme, **Homecoming Week** includes an assembly, lunch activities, spirit dinner, football game against the Waialua Bulldogs, and homecoming dance. On **National "Make-A-Difference Day"** parents, students and staff work on campus improvements. The Kaulana Chapter of the National Honor Society sponsors the first of two annual **Blood Bank of Hawai'i Blood Drives** in the library. Kalāheo fully implements **MealTime**, a computerized system for purchasing school meals.

NOVEMBER

Treetops Restaurant at Paradise Park in Mānoa is the scene of the annual **Senior Luau**. The **Junior Varsity Football** team makes it to the OIA playoffs and is declared cochamps of the White Division. The **Men's Volleyball** team captures the OIA Title for the second year. The Kalāheo community discusses the Academic and Financial plan at a **PTSA/Community meeting**. Planning for **Project Grad** is in full gear with car washes, HI 5 recycling and other fundraisers.

DECEMBER

The History Fair and Breakfast Potluck features displays, mini-theater, documentaries and other presentations sponsored by the Ninth Grade Transition Team and the Social Studies Department. Student leaders attend the State Student Conference. Rising Starz Assembly recognizes talented student performers. Associated Students of Kalāheo (ASK) sponsor Winter Spirit Week. Cadets attend the annual ROTC Winter Ball is at the Convention Center for an island wide celebration. NJROTC Special Operations return to Schofield Barracks to defend their Adventure Training Test Championship and return with three first place and one second place trophy. JANUARY

Senior Financial Aid Information Night is attended by interested students and parents. **Semester exams** assess students' learning. "Dancing in the Streets" is the theme

of **ASK's New Year's Dance** in the cafeteria featuring clever decorations using a cityscape and lights. **DECA** collects 600 pounds of canned goods and other food items for the Hawai'i Food Bank. Continuing their **Project Grad** fund raising, parent organizers sponsor a raffle ticket drawing for six Chevron gas cards, each worth \$500.

FEBRUARY

The Women's Softball Team earns the 2006 OIA Division II Championship. Entrepreneurs in the Probability and Statistics class organize student-run businesses to create a financial plan and start up a profitable business: Phatty Plate Lunches, Mista Freeze, Billy Wonka, Kalaheo Wear, Asian Express, Chix of '06 and K.B.H. The new Kalāheo Fan Club initiates fund raising to purchase and install ceiling fans in all classrooms.

MARCH

Throughout the month, sophomores complete mandatory Hawai'i State Assessment testing. Junior Varsity Boys, Girls, and Mixed Canoe Paddling Teams take first place in the OIA Championships. Through social studies classes, ASK conductions elections for school year 2006-07.

APRIL

ASK plans a **Spring Spirit Week** and a **Spring Leader-ship Camp**. The entire student body and faculty/staff participate in a **mandatory off-campus evacuation** to Kawai Nui Neighborhood Park, a walking distance of .55 miles; an evaluating official comments, "It was the best evacuation I've seen." To fund student scholarships and the Kalāheo Fan Club, the PTSA holds its successful annual **Silent Auction and Wine-Tasting** is at Luana Hills Country Club. **Project Grad** continues its fund raising efforts with Koala Moa Chicken Sale and Holiday Travel Giveaway.

MAY

It was a "Midsummer's Night Dream" at the Hyatt Regency, venue for the Junior/Senior Prom. The success of the Multicultural Assembly ensures it will be an annual event where students and faculty display multi-talents, highlighting songs and dances from many cultures. Teacher Ap**preciation Week** celebrates our faculty with breakfasts, luncheons, snacks and expressions of appreciation. The annual NJROTC Banquet, Anatomy Night and Academic Awards Ceremony involve students, faculty and families in recognizing students' learning and other achievements. Other end-of-the year events include a Farewell Assembly, Aloha Dance, Shakespeare Festival and ASK **Leadership Banquet**. On May $2\hat{8}^{th}$, the Kalāheo High School Foundation and Alumni Association's Community Luau draws approximately 75 loyal Mustangs to the gym. Seven athletes place in various events at the Windward Area Special Olympics at Kaiser High School.



Faculty Updates

Sharon Ehrhorn, a 37-year veteran of the Kalāheo social studies department, retired in June 2006. During those years, Ehrhorn taught thousands of Kalāheo students in Economics, American Problems, Global Studies, and Advanced Placement European History. But, she says, "Street Law was probably



my favorite course; a team of students entered and won the State Mock Trial competition."

Several of her former students have also become teachers, including Toni Childers who taught at Kalāheo and Vanessa Yaeger Souki, currently on the faculty. Ehrhorn has fond memories of participating in graduations at the Waikīkī Shell with colleague Ellen Libby.

Even though she is now on endless "summer vacation," Ehrhorn recently said, "With the current crazy world situation, I will almost miss not being in the classroom to give background and points of view. I'm still clipping news articles and thinking about bulletin boards."

Beth Fincke will officially retire in a few months. She left Kalāheo in June 2005 intending to retire but took a position in a State DOE office. Fincke started her Kalāheo career 39 years ago in 1967 at Kalāheo Hillside Intermediate and was on leave during the 1973-74 and 1984-85 school years. A teacher with many talents, Fincke taught various levels of intermediate and secondary Spanish, Geography, Hawaiian History, Pre-Algebra, German, Drama, Theatre History, American Problems, Global Studies, U.S. History, Advanced Placement U.S. History, and Newswrit-

ing, including producing the student newspaper.

Additionally, she and colleague Barry Mumper taught Electronic Media, helping students produce closed-circuit "Kalāheo Morning News" broadcasts shown at the start of each school day. With colleague John Connelly, she taught U.S. History and American Problems/Global Studies in the Communications Academy.

Beyond the classroom, Fincke advised the German Club, Pacific and Asian Affairs Council, Student Govern-

ment, Kalāheo Theatre Society, International Thespian Society Kalāheo Chapter, and the classes of 1982 and 1994.

Fincke was involved in one way or another with many graduation ceremonies, including the one and only on-campus commencement when the Class of 1994 graduated in the gym. For many years, she was



also a lunch server in the Kalāheo Cafeteria, answering the call for adult help to speed students through the lines.

Both Ehrhorn and Fincke served on the Kalāheo Foundation board in the organization's early years.

Other recently retired Kalāheo teachers are Barry Mumper, Sharon Shiraki, Andrea Kitaoka, Pat Middlesworth and Gary Hirata. Phil Chase, former Kalāheo librarian, retired this year from Kahuku Elementary.

Mac Salad Adapted by Curtiss Briggs ('76)

8 ounces elbow macaroni 2 cups Best Foods mayonnaise 1/3 bunch parsley (no stems) 2 ½ ounces carrot, peeled and cut into chunks

1/8 teaspoon pepper ½ teaspoon pickle relish 1/8 teaspoon salt

Cook macaroni, drain and dry (must be dry for best results). Use food processor to finely mince parsley and carrots. Combine all ingredients and mix well. Refrigerate at least two hours. Taste and add salt and pepper if needed. Serves 10.
