H-Building Courtyard — In one of the four planters, colorful crotons and pothos groundcover now surround the mustang sculpture under the plumeria tree

The adjacent planter has been cleared and replanted with croton, and groundcover is coming soon. The Asian garden will also get some needed attention.

A fourth planter contains an orange metal sculpture titled "Graduation" by Jim Charlton. Due to several areas of rust, the State's Conservation Coordinator has been contacted, and we will follow-up regarding needed repairs.

The sculpture is a product of the Art in Public Places Program established by the State Legislature in 1967 which designated one percent of the construction costs of new buildings for the acquisition of works of art, either by commission or purchase.

Members of the KHSF Projects and Programs Committee will continue their work until they are satisfied that the spacious courtyard is a visual expression of school pride.
